Message from the President:

Time to Reflect, Time to Celebrate!

What a year! I hope that you feel as pumped as I do about the Kensington-Rockville Branch. We have welcomed several stimulating new members, launched a handsome, informative website, expanded our outreach and visibility, and made a tradition of breaking bread together.

We learned: how a female astronomer earning less than a janitor at her university ultimately became NASA's "Mother of the Hubble"; how recent Supreme Court decisions impact women;

how to better understand, appreciate, and even write poetry—which we did, and dared to share.

We journeyed: to the Maryland Women's Heritage Center in Baltimore for the AAUW MD fall conference, where we heard the goals and gratitude of women scholars supported by AAUW fellowships and grants; to Capitol Hill for a lively and instructive tour of the extraordinary Folger Shakespeare Library and Theater; to Howard County for the annual state convention, where AAUW's latest research report, *Barriers and Bias: the Status of Women in Leadership*, was highlighted.

We engaged our community: by participating in Sonya Kovalesky Day to promote STEM careers for girls and continuing to build our relationship with Montgomery College; by cooperating with the county's Human Trafficking Task Force and informing ourselves and others about the horrors and costs of this life-shattering scourge; by helping to host a useful School Board candidates' forum; by attending lectures at the Universities at Shady Grove to introduce ourselves while enhancing our comprehension of the migrant and refugee crises at this chaotic, dangerous time.

We acted. We met, button-holed, and listened to local, state, and national political leaders at the Commission for Women's annual Women's Legislative Briefing. We received updates and strengthened commitments at a reception of the Maryland Legislative Agenda for Women. We wrote, lobbied, and testified in Annapolis—and won significant victories. Equal pay for equal work is now the law in Maryland!

We gave. Kensington-Rockville was Number 1, again, in branch giving to AAUW priorities. We provided scholarships for two mature women students at Montgomery College. We are well on our way to earning the status of Charting the Course Navigator in AAUW's campaign to raise \$1 million in unrestricted funds.

Public Policy Update 5/22/16 Anita Rosen, Maryland AAUW Vice President for Public Policy

Thank you AAUW and thank you Kensington-Rockville Branch! Why the thank -you's? Well, without AAUW I would not have had the opportunity to be standing behind Governor Hogan as he signed SB 481 / HB 1003 The Equal Pay bill on Thursday, May 19th. And standing next to me was Senator Susan Lee, another member of Kensington-Rockville AAUW. Senator Lee was the main sponsor of the Senate bill, who spoke eloquently for it at committee the hearing, and worked so effectively with the many partners to make Maryland one of the most progressive states in the US in regard to Pay Equity legislation and eliminating barriers to Equity such as the "employer Defense" loophole and prohibiting retaliation against sharing salary and job information. Thanks to AAUW's national office



who supplied legislative alerts, research data, and materials that helped make our case. Thanks to the our coalition partner, Working Families, who invited Senator Lee and me to speak at the Press Conference in front of the State House before the bill signing. We were pleased that Kate Nielson of the National AAUW staff joined us for that event. It was her first bill signing as well as mine! But it certainly was not Senator Lee's first--she has successfully sponsored a number of bills that help make Maryland a better place

for women, children and families. And last, but certainly not least, THANK YOU. So many Kensington-Rockville Branch members responded to calls to help promote important legislation. Your calls really do make a difference!

Kensington-Rockville Branch Members Well-Represented at the Maryland State Convention

On Saturday, April 30th, several members of the Kensington-Rockville Branch attended the Maryland AAUW State Convention at Howard County Community College. In addition to hearing presentations from national Board and staff members and a public policy update, the members attended the business meeting. Several topics were discussed:

- 1. Promote National members to join the state without joining a branch. This is now possible, but it needs to be encouraged. Angela will head up a committee to look into ways in which we can promote this idea. Joyce, Anita and Pat Stocker volunteered to be on the committee.
- 2. Do we need a Public Policy Statement for the state? Anita will head a committee to look into printing a brochure and/or putting both bills that we've worked on and general information about our positions. Anita asked about applying for an Impact Grant for Public Policy and it was voted to do so. This would pay for extra expenses involved in printing a brochure.

3. Bylaws. The current bylaws that need to be changed. For example,



branch presidents are not members of the State board at the present time and that should be changed. Dorothy Fraquelli asked for a volunteer to redo the bylaws, but there were no takers!

- 4. The summer conference will be on July 23. The location is uncertain.
- 5. State convention for 2017 will be in Easton either late March or early April. It will be the 75th.
- 6. Eileen Menton encouraged people to give AAUW MD's archives to the U. of Maryland.

7. Eileen also asked for someone to handle Facebook for the state—maybe the website, also.

Kensington-Rockville Branch won, again, first place in the financial support of AAUW funds.

April Branch Meeting

On Saturday, April 23rd, approximately 15 members of the Branch convened at the Schweinhaut Senior Center in Silver Spring to attend a creative writing workshop led by poet Craig Flaherty. Since retiring as a church musician in 2001, Mr. Flaherty has been writing poetry and playing chamber music. Having studied with Ann Becker, Poet Laureate of Takoma Park, he now regularly attends her workshop "Writing a Village." He divides his time between his yellow pad and playing music at the Montgomery County Chamber Music Society in Rockville. Long-time friend Maritsa George declares that "Craig is a wordsmith who finds poetic thought in music and the spoken word. He is a maker of connections between thought, emotion and self, a great friend with a great laugh." The attendees



learned that every culture has its own poetic style, ranging from iambic pentameter to haiku to villanelle. According to the presenter, poetry emerges from listening and feeling (e.g., glad, mad, scared and sad) and seeks to overcome our tendency to live from the "ears up and the wrists down." Mr. Flaherty described various techniques for writing poetry such as recalling aromas from

childhood, using pictures to stimulate thoughts and emotions, picking a random word from the dictionary as a prompt, and writing words on a card and selecting one from a jar to begin the artistic process. After reading some of Mr. Flaherty's many poems, and writing and sharing their own creations, the Branch members convened for a leisurely lunch at a nearby Asian restaurant, Red Maple.
