Marching for Women in Washington and around the World!

AAUW was there—at the Women's March on Washington on Saturday, January 21, 2017, passing out gigantic AAUW buttons, to identify us and invite questions about our historic organization. We (Brian and I, Tracy Lantz, and her friend Mindy) were there. I hope you were—though beyond our rendezvous at the Newseum, we gave up trying to find anyone we knew among the more than half a million(!) women and men, and children, from all over the country proclaiming that "Women's Rights Are Human Rights."



As more and more people kept coming all day, crowding ever closer, we all seemed ever happier, friendlier, nicer, more helpful to one another, delighted and grateful for the validation and power we achieved together. The planners had to, finally, call off the "march"; there were too many people too packed together to walk! We did shuffle along, stop and go, for several blocks but on Jefferson Drive on the Mall, not the official Independence Avenue route, because we couldn't get near the latter. More thousands thronged Pennsylvania Avenue.

A sea of pink pussyhats and countless clever (some unprintable) placards spoke of women's anger when men (in truth, that man) groped women's private parts and bragged about it: "Keep Your Paws Off My [photo of hissing cat]!" Girls Just Want FUN—damental Rights." "I do not like you down my shirt, I do not like you up my skirt, I do not like you near my rump. I do not like you, Mr. Trump!"

Other committed kindred spirits championed every imaginable compatible cause—family planning: "Keep Your Theology Off My Biology"; racial justice: "Black Lives Matter"; LGBTQ rights: "Respect My Existence or Expect My Resistance"; immigration: "Build Bridges, Not Walls"; Muslims: "This [varied photos] Is What America Looks Like"; global warming: "Polar Bears Against Climate Change."

There was virtually no security. There was no need. No violence. No unpleasantness, even with the few counter-protest signs scattered about. It was a peaceful, uplifting, exhausting, exhilarating, impelling, historic day.

And we were only one (by far the largest) of more than 600 similar protest marches all over the United States and on every continent—including Antarctica! "Make America Kind Again." "Make America Think Again." "Love Trumps Hate." "Men of Quality Value Women of Equality."
