Learning from Our AAUW History

Our November 11 Kensington-Rockville joint branch meeting with Bethesda Chevy Chase at Fox Hill proved to be a stimulating success! Over 50 people braved cold temperatures to learn

more about the 1977 National Women's Conference in Houston. AAUW along with other women's organizations (BPW, NOW, and LWV) was instrumental in coordinating and helping to produce the conference. From November 18 to 21, 1977 delegates from 50 states, the District of Columbia, and five U.S. territories debated, caucused, and after two and one-half days endorsed 25 resolutions calling for greater government involvement in establishing equal rights, protections, and opportunities for American women. Then AAUW President Marjorie Bell Chambers stated, "AAUW members can be proud of something that happened in Houston. As I stood up to speak on sex discrimination in education, I had no more than announced who I was when there was resounding applause, which frankly threw me off balance. Others assured me, however, that this was a

demonstration of recognition by the delegates that AAUW had indeed played a very significant role in the Network and in the Pro-Plan Caucus."

Kate Campbell Stevenson, current co-president of the Kensington-Rockville branch, led a panel of outstanding women leaders who shared their challenges and successes in helping move women's leadership in1960's to the present. Panelists Tina Hobson, first director of Federal Executive Women (FEW) recounted with great humor and sobering statistics how her first office was in a closet behind her boss' secretary's desk! But with great tenacity Hobson helped move women out of the sequestered background to leadership positions in the Federal Government.





"Loveland feminist donates life's work to Alice Paul Institute in New Jersey"

For some of us, this *Loveland* (Colorado) *Reporter-Herald* headline alone tells the Margaret Zierdt story—a perfect coda to an astonishing achievement we witnessed in progress over several decades.

Margaret was a long-time member of the Rockville, and then Kensington-Rockville, Branch.

Well, yes, she did drop her membership for a time to protest AAUW's vote to admit men in 1987! But she returned, and we welcomed back Margaret's encyclopedic knowledge of women's history, passionate advocacy for gender equality, and proud, feisty self. She moved to Colorado in 2010 to live near Carolyn Taylor, her devoted daughter.

Now 96, Margaret is moving to a senior care community. But what of all the feminist literature she has amassed—some 650 books, periodicals, and her own copious research files, writings, and speeches? She documented women from

the 5th century on, from witches to mathematicians, and "how women have been contributing forever and not recognized," says Carolyn, amazed.

Happily, as the newspaper notes, thanks to fundraising assistance from the National Women's History Project, on whose board of directors Margaret long served, her entire collection (minus two boxes of files on specific women already donated to the Maryland State Archives) will go to the library of the Alice Paul Institute, housed in the legendary suffragist's childhood home in Mount Laurel, New Jersey.

How fitting! Alice Paul, a lifelong militant activist for women's equality, organized the massive

parade for national women's suffrage in Washington, DC, on 3 March 1913, the day before Woodrow Wilson's inauguration. Some 8,000 women and nine bands marched, but the mostly male crowd harassed and assaulted them, hospitalizing 100. Police stood by. It would take seven more years for the 19th Amendment to become law. Margaret, at 90+ years, marched in the centennial commemoration of this seminal parade on a blustery 3 March 2013. Both indefatigably championed the Equal Rights Amendment, which Paul introduced 1923, and remains unratified.

Montgomery College Food Pantry Receives Donation from KR Branch Members

According to a September 2017 report from the Urban Institute, more than one in 10 college students experience food insecurity-- lacking consistent access to enough food for an active, healthy life. The report, "Assessing Food Insecurity on Campus: A National Look at Food

Insecurity among America's College Students," found that certain students, particularly those who are in two-year colleges and students of color, are significantly more likely to experience food insecurity.

Recognizing the need to address food insecurity in its own student population, the Montgomery College Food Pantry, run by the staff of the Women's and Gender Studies Program, provides nonperishable food items - particularly snack items, that students and the community can access on campus. The items are stacked in a rolling cart and placed outside the Women's and Gender Studies Program offices allowing students to discretely take what they need. The staff also fill

bags of staple items like beans, rice, and soup, for individuals and families who ask for help.

During the September and October KR Branch meetings, members generously donated several boxes of food for the Food Pantry.
