Roxanne Mirabal-Beltran, Janet Wert Crampton American Fellow Roxanne is studying for a PhD in Public Health in the Population, Family, and Reproductive Health Department of Johns Hopkins University. She is interested in the health disparities experienced by the Latino community, in particular how race, gender, education, and socio-economic status (of both patient and provider) contribute to these differences.



Cynthia Nyaoro, Career Development Grantee

Cynthia, from Kenya, is using her grant at George Washington University toward her academic goal of an MBA in accounting. She tracks the financial resources of the Kenya RAPID program, which seeks to improve availability of water and sanitation for people and livestock and rebuild a healthy, sustainable ecosystem in arid northern Kenya. She has also kept girls in school by helping to provide sanitary pads and safe, accessible toilets. We know of Cynthia's interest in AAUW, she has already attended two branch meetings.



Elina Thapa, Dian Belanger International Fellow (funded by AAUW Maryland)

Elina, from Nepal, is a civil engineer pursuing a Masters degree in Project Management at the University of Maryland College Park. She wants to become a leader in managing infrastructure construction projects that are energy-efficient and low-carbon-emitting in remote rural areas of the world.

AAUW Funds

At the October 2017 board meeting, AAUW Maryland selected **Kate Campbell Stevenson** as Maryland's 2018 Woman of Distinction. She will be honored at the AAUW National Conference for College Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL) Women of Distinction Ceremony on May 31, 2018.

The Conference, which attracts more than 1,000 students from throughout the United States, is held in late May/early June at the University of Maryland, College Park. As the platinum sponsor of the Ceremony, AAUW Maryland names its own Woman of Distinction. To date, Barbara Fetterhoff, Janet Crampton, Jenny Forehand, Dr. Mary Grace Roman, and Cleopatra Campbell have been honored thanks to generous donations from AAUW Maryland members who provide the platinum sponsorship cost of \$20,000 each year by April 1.

The Kensington/Rockville AAUW Branch Board has set goals for contributions to this fund: 100% of Board members and 50% of Branch members, a contribution of any amount. You can contribute on-line at the AAUW website or write a check to AAUW Funds. Write the fund

AAUW Membership Dues for 2018-2019

Effective March16, 2018, AAUW National Membership dues will increase from \$49 to \$59, of which \$56 is tax deductible as a charitable contribution. The remaining \$3 is not tax deductible because it supports the AAUW Action Fund's section 501(c)(4) Capitol Hill Lobby Corps and get-out-the-vote activities.

Paid Life Membership Individuals who qualify for national membership may pay 20 times the national rate one time and become exempt from further national dues. AAUW national life membership is \$1,180 and is fully tax deductible.

Honorary Life Membership Individuals who qualify for national membership and have been members for 50 years can apply for honorary life membership and become exempt from further national dues.

The Maryland AAUW dues of \$16 and the Kensington Rockville Branch dues of \$10 are not being increased. For 2018-2019, members of the branch will pay \$85 and paid life members will pay \$26. Current branch members' dues expire on 6/30/2018. A renewal form and a link to the AAUW on-line dues website will be available in next month's branch newsletter.

The Groupe Francais

GROUPE FRANCAIS se réunit une fois par mois autour d'un œuvre littéraire choisie d'un commun accord. On y étudie l'œuvre en lisant le texte intégral. Ainsi *Boule de Suif* de Guy de Maupassant, *La Nuit* de Elie Weisel, et dernièrement *L'Hôte* d'Albert Camus, depuis plusieurs mois, ont fait l'objet de lectures assidues et de commentaires partagés par les membres du Groupe. Les discussions en français sont animées et cultivées. La découverte - ou la redécouverte - de ces textes classiques apporte un vrai plaisir intellectuel au groupe.

Avant de passer à la partie rigoureuse de nos activités, les conversations idéalement en français vont bien avec l'arrivée des membres chez l'un d'entre eux - notre préambule en quelque sorte. On y parle de la France, de sa gastronomie, des voyages lointains ou de proximité entrepris par les plus aventurières parmi nous, de la politique en Europe, de l'éducation, ou des événements qui ponctuent nos vies familiales. Le charme du groupe vient d'une entente *bon enfant* entre les membres, d'une gentillesse partagée, de récits d'expériences enrichissantes vécues par les membres, toujours évoqués avec humour et qui suscitent le rire et la bonne humeur. On se quitte à regret tant il est vrai qu'il n'est pas rare que nous restions ensemble plus de trois heures. Une collation, un goûter, un repas du soir léger, ou un buffet est toujours offert gracieusement par l'hôtesse et contribue à créer cette atmosphère à la fois détendue et civilisée dans le cadre toujours agréable d'une maison ouverte à tour de rôle comme lieu de rencontre. « Bienvenue » is the word! The French Group meets once a month around one French literary work selected by consensus. The Group studies the piece of literature by reading aloud the original text and discussing its concepts and themes. *Boule de Suif* by Guy de Maupassant, *La Nuit* by Elie Weisel, and recently *L'Hôte* by Albert Camus, have been the objects of our animated cultural discussions.

Before tackling our more rigorous pursuits, diversified conversations – ideally in French – start as we arrive at a member's home and form our *préambule*, as it were. France, gastronomy, travels (far and near) by the most aventurous, European affairs, education, or the various events of our family lives are all shared in the *Bon Enfant* charm that defines the group where humour and laughter rule !

We leave reluctantly. It is not rare for our meetings to last past three hours. Afternoon tea, light dinner fare or a small buffet spread is always graciously offered by the hostess and contributes to the relaxed and civilised atmosphere in the cadre of one member's open home that serves as a rotated venue. « Bienvenue « is the word!
