National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute



Dr. Cook is the chief of staff in the Immediate Office of the Director (IOD) of the National Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute (NHLBI), part of the National Institutes of Health (NIH). She provides leadership for the strategic direction of the women's health research agenda at NHLBI and serves as a spokesperson related to the health of women for the Institute.

Dr. Cook is board certified in cardiology. She received a Bachelor of Science degree in materials science and engineering from the University of Alabama at Birmingham, a Doctor of Medicine from Harvard Medical School, and clinical training in primary care/internal medicine and cardiology at Massachusetts General Hospital (MGH). Dr. Cook completed a fellowship in Health Services Research at the Harvard School of Public Health. She is also an alumnus of the

Commonwealth Fund/Harvard University Fellowship in Minority Health Policy and completed her Master of Public Health with a concentration in health care policy as part of this fellowship.

A New Year's Message

As we begin another year for AAUW Kensington-Rockville Branch, I would like to say thank you to all who made 2018 a particularly successful year for our branch. Our branch is blessed to be made up of leaders who lend their time, talent and treasure to provide outstanding programs, interest groups, and advocacy opportunities throughout the year.

It remains a trying time for women in Maryland and across the country. Chaos and crisis seemed to be the news every day. It was impossible to ignore yet more school shootings, family separation at the border, sexual assault allegations alleged against powerful men (including President Trump and Supreme Court Justice Kavanaugh), a roll-back of Title IX protections against campus sexual assault, and more. Perhaps it was inevitable that the 2018 elections would result in a dramatic change in both the Congress and the Maryland General Assembly -- with voters electing historic high numbers of women and defeating incumbents previously thought untouchable.

Meanwhile, our KR Branch members continue to fight back. Many joined AAUW Lobby Corps to advocate for equal pay, against the confirmation of Justice Kavanaugh, for paid sick leave, and more. Still others testified in Annapolis on legislation to end parental rights for rapists, ban salary history questions in employment, provide emergency contraception for college students, extend child support orders for purposes of higher education, and more. Maryland AAUW members sent thousands of emails to Congress and the Maryland General Assembly to make our voices heard through action alerts on these issues.

While advocacy tends to get top billing at AAUW, it is really the relationships we build through programming and interest groups that feeds the soul of our membership. Anita Rosen and Pat Ameling engineered monthly meetings with interesting speakers and lively conversation. Sylvia Crowder and Martisa George hosted a fabulous new member tea that is sure to become an annual event. Our interest groups, led by Parma Holt, Marianne Jacobs, Ruth Spivack, Margaret Schweitzer and Judy Burr, continue to delight and bring new members to our branch. Our branch consistently brings the most members to state meetings and conventions. Bottom line, we are an active bunch who love each other's company.

All branch activities take a lot of work. In addition to our board and interest group leaders, I would like to take this opportunity to thank my "Unsung AAUW KR Branch SHEro" of 2018, Margery Sullivan, our Newsletter Editor.
